Objectives – Students of International Studies learn about the history, politics, economics, languages, art, and literatures of different nations. Engaging in International Studies allows students to become more active participants in the global community by understanding how different nations think, rule themselves, and relate to each other. Students work with their advisor to design a cohesive program of study with an emphasis in either the humanities or the social sciences.

Minimum required credits = 56

Core requirements:

- A. Proficiency in first foreign language equivalent to 4 courses beyond Beginning II
- B. Proficiency in second foreign language equivalent to Beginning II
- C. A study abroad experience
- D. **Choose two from the following:**
